Announcements

ARES - Bob Felt, (W4RYF), spoke on the ARRL Vision for ARES, with a 3-part training track, as follows:

- 1) You must have an amateur radio license.
- 2) Taking an ARRL Emergency Management course and 5 free online FEMA ICS courses will let you be a member of ARES.

3) For a leadership position, there is an additional ARRL Emergency Management course and 6 more FEMA ICS courses.

Bob clarified that NC uses AuxComm, which has its own requirements, not those of the ARRL. NC says that it doesn't use the ARRL's training track.

QSO Contesting

James Reed (KK4JF0) spoke about the club's participation in the February 23rd to24th at the North Carolina and South Carolina QSO Parties. He said they had a blast, although conditions were horrible on Saturday and not much better on Sunday. Almost all of his contacts were on 80 meters, as all other bands were dead most of the day. The last two hours of Sunday went much better, but James still stayed on 80 to rack up a lot more contacts.

Expedition Contesting

Danny (NA4X) added comments on his type of participation in the NC QSO Party. He and Carl (KW4EO) did an "Expedition" with off-car antennas set up and not operating mobile, but still counting as a Rover. Danny wanted to activate Clay County, which counts as an extra bonus and is often hard to find on the air. He picked a spot on the county line with Macon County to count as two multipliers, but found that the band noise was too high due to power lines across the street. After about an hour there, they moved down the road, but then were only in Clay County. They made contacts using an end-fed 80m antenna, but found they had noise coming from both their generator and computer. They ended up running off of a battery and doing paper logging, stopping occasionally to charge the battery from the generator. Danny said that even so, it was fun and they will try it again. He suggested that anyone considering something like this call CQ and not fret about checking duplications real-time. Other suggestions:

- 1) **Test**. They did some advance testing of their setup, but not a full test.
- 2) **Be flexible**. Be ready to move, change your setup, etc.
- 3) **Have a Backup Plan**. Have alternates for the computer, radio, antennas.
- 4) **Understand propagation**. (This will be a future meeting topic.)

Community Activities

Danny (NA4X) announced upcoming communication activities. The *Hellbender 100 Run* will be April 12-13, with runners going from Old Fort to Mount Mitchell. It starts Friday and runners are to be at the finish line by 8:00 AM Saturday. Contact Bill Van Nuys (N400C) for info and to sign up to help. Danny also reminded us to mark our calendars for the *WNC Flyer* on June 2, a 100-mile bike ride starting and ending in Pisgah Forest. It's one of the most fun activities we do, and our participation helps and is greatly appreciated by the *Blue Ridge Bike Club*. Also, don't forget *Field Day* on June 22-23. More info will be coming on both of these.

From The Shack

Carl Stover (KW4EO) invited all to visit the club's Shack at any time. We had a recent donation of equipment, but not much is of any use. One potentially-nice item was an antenna analyzer, but the batteries had been left in it for several years and had corroded, rendering the unit non-repairable. Carl told us about the recent "Evening in the Shack" activity held on two consecutive Thursdays. The first night was learning to solder. At the second, each participant built a Pixie



40-meter transceiver, receiving the kit for free. There were 18 participants and 4 instructors, and 17 kits are working with 1 still incomplete. All who make contacts (even across the room at the club meeting) will be entered into a drawing for a \$20 cash prize this weekend. 7 of the participants were "youngsters", all of whom completed their kits. An 11-year-old girl who had never soldered before had hers work the first time she turned it on.

Carl also talked about the work of David Day (N1DAY) and Ernie Hollingsworth (KC4SIT) with SSTV (Slow Scan TV), including following the Sunday night nets. He said that you can use an ancient computer and a very basic receiver to listen and view the results.

Nick Andrews (K9GVM) co-taught the Pixie class. He mentioned that although he is not colorblind, he and others had problems with the color codes on some of the components. He recommends using a meter to check components as you install them in any project. Carl mentioned there is a \$20 Chinese transistor tester available that also measures resistance and capacitance. For \$4 more you can get a case for it. It could save you lots of grief!

On behalf of the club, James thanked Carl, Nick and the other instructors for a great project. He said all participants were comfortable, and the project was well-done by good teachers.

Blue Ridge Amateur Radio Club (BRARC)

Radio operators come from all walks of life. Some are students, teachers, pilots, technicians, police officers, doctors, executives, retired military, engineers, you name it.

The Blue Ridge Amateur Radio Club (BRARC) is all of these things. Another key benefit it that they give-back in many ways back to their community. Amateur radio operators at BRARC donate time and equipment to participate with the Department of Emergency Management, the Red Cross, and FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency). Radio operators practice using their equipment without power from the grid. So during REAL emergencies they can supply the necessary communication to first responders so they can provide help to those who need it. Hurricane Sandy was a perfect example. Ham radio operators helped FEMA direct needed supplies and medical attention.

BRARC also provides volunteer community support in a variety of community activities including, parades including the 4th of July, and Christmas parades, walk-a-thons, bike-a-thons, and the Fletcher Flier.

The *Blue Ridge Amateur Radio Club* also provides daily and weekly forums via what they call "*Nets*." You don't need a ham license to listen to a net - just a radio. These forums include informal sessions or "*rag chews*" that discuss local events or just about any topic.
